This year, we also took steps to unveil a refreshed marketing and brand campaign to showcase the power and excitement of Big Brothers Big Sisters programming. We were excited to join all of the Big Brothers Big Sisters affiliates across the country as we became Defenders of Potential.

What's more, are the outcomes that we measure in displaying to our communities that mentoring is effective in shaping the lives of our community's children. In 2018 we are proud to report that:

- Nearly 700 Bigs and Littles spent time together as a match.
- 61% of child participants in our Community Based Program reported an improvement in Social Acceptance.
- 70% of child participants in our Community Based Program reported an improvement in Scholastic Competency
- 56% of children in our Site Based Program reported an increase in Parental Trust

Lastly, we remain committed to the innovation needed to stay ahead of both recruitment and funding needs. Our Work and Play Initiative is well positioned for 2019 to create even more strategic partners and create more positive relationships. To that end, our new used sporting goods store, Sporting World, has garnered immense support. We are appreciative of the generosity of so many that made the launch so successful.

In 2019, Big Brothers Big Sisters of Northwestern Wisconsin looks forward to inspiring positive change in even more children and their families. 





For 34 years, Janet Proctor served as the backbone of child safety and youth mentorship programming for Big Brothers Big Sisters of Northwestern Wisconsin. Her enduring commitment to bridging the children of our community with positive adult role models serves as inspiration that better is possible. As former Program Director for Big Brothers Big Sisters she utilized her extensive knowledge of juvenile justice and social work to establish the agency as a thought leader in youth mentorship. The Janet E. Proctor Legacy Scholarship was established in 2015 with the first scholarship awarded in the Fall of 2016.

Each year, the Janet E. Proctor Legacy Scholarship is awarded to a mentee or "Little" who previously participated in the Big Brothers Big Sisters community-based or site-based program. Former Littles, with current or pending enrollment at an accredited institution of higher education, are encouraged to apply this scholarship which awards a minimum \$1,000 annually to eligible applicants. The scholarship funds are paid directly to the designated school of enrollment to offset the cost of tuition, fees or books.

Big Brothers Big Sisters is dedicated to changing the lives of children who face adversity. We are proud to be able to support the endeavors of former littles that once thought higher education was not possible. In 2018, our scholarship selection committee was pleased to award two stipends to the following former littles:
